

# Crane Park Hanworth Road to Hospital Bridge Road

Crane Park is on both sides of the river for this stretch. The semi deciduous woodland covers much of the park but there are grasslands, small islands, reed beds and wetland areas. The park is managed for wildlife and has a rich history as the site of Hounslow Gunpowder Mills on the Richmond bank and Hanworth Farms, a model farm, now the site of Butts Farm estate on the Hounslow bank. London Wildlife Trust manages Crane Park Island and has an education centre based in a tower linked to the gunpowder mills.

### Hospital Bridge Road to Meadway

This narrow linear section of park includes areas of grassland, flower meadows, wetland, reed beds and a native hedge planted with fruit trees. The area around Mill Road was the site of Fulwell Mill and Fulwell Lodge once home to ex-King Manoel of Portugal. There are information boards in the park exploring the history and ecology of the site.

## Kneller Gardens to Craneford Recreation Ground

Kneller Gardens is a popular local park with play and sporting facilities. There are toilets and refreshments available.

Mereway Nature Park is a small area of bramble scrub, woodland and meadow. The site contains an outdoor classroom for use by schools.

The River Crane has been put into a concrete channel from this point. Craneford Recreation Grounds include playing fields, a playground and a small wooded area to explore.



#### Duke of Northumberland's River

The Duke of Northumberland's River, built in the 16th century to supply water to the mills in Isleworth, links the river Crane with the Thames along a narrow wildlife corridor.

### Craneford Recreation Ground to London Road

Twickenham Junction Rough, provides valuable habitat of bramble scrub and woodland. It has recently been brought into public ownership and a pathway from Marsh Farm Lane gives access to the site.



London Road to Chertsey Road (through Moormead Recreation Ground)

Moormead Park includes a children's playground, tennis courts and sports pitches. It is the site of the annual St Margarets Fair.

### Chertsey Road to River Thames

From St Margarets it is difficult to follow the River Crane to the River Thames at Isleworth as much of the bank is in private ownership. Before it flows into the River Thames the river becomes tidal. Isleworth Ait nature reserve can be seen on the Thames at the mouth of the river.

### Lower Crane Valley

The Lower Crane Valley is a linked network of open spaces along the River Crane. Many of these spaces are of high environmental significance and valued for recreation.

The variety of flora and fauna create an important wildlife corridor for west London. The River Crane, a tributary of the River Thames, also supports a diverse range of aquatic and marginal river wildlife.

This leaflet highlights the open spaces, walks and some of the carved benches to be found along the paths.
