Dear Friends,

In this issue we provide updates on the Crane pollution events and local development proposals plus we focus on the improvements proposed by FORCE and our partners at various locations along the lower Crane.

Crane Pollution

The pollution event of October last year put a large volume of neat sewage sludge into the river from a Thames Water pipe near to Cranford and the A30 crossing. We understand that there is an ongoing criminal investigation relating to the incident but have little further information.

We have undertaken two recent sampling sessions of the invertebrates in the river and these have been reasonably positive, indicating a good level of survival within the river sediment. However, the information on fish remains very worrying. FORCE Trustees and other contacts have seen no fish in the river since the incident, with the exception of a few sticklebacks, and the kingfishers have also disappeared. We would be very grateful for any observations of fish or

kingfishers from our members, along with times and locations.

We understand that all relevant papers have been submitted by the Environment Agency regarding

the October 2011 pollution event but we still have no date for the case to be heard. FORCE trustees have provided a witness statement for the case.

We are aware that these two major pollution incidents are not isolated events and this has been highlighted by a report (posted on our website) from a local fisherman who has recorded seventeen serious fish kills on the Crane in the 27 years from 1986 to 2013. We remain very concerned about the current state and future vulnerability of the river.

College Developments


We are monitoring the proposed development at the Richmond College site and the potential implications for local open spaces and the Crane environment. We are engaging with the council on these issues. We understand that a landscape plan is being produced and have requested to meet the consultants.

The Village Green inquiry for the east playing field was held in early December and we expect to hear the decision in the next three months. However the inspector decides, and the matter is likely to turn on interpretations of case law, we have shown conclusively that the public has used this field throughout the last fifty years, and we are certain that local people will strongly resist any attempt to remove this right of access.

Post Office Sorting Office and the Twickenham Station sites

We met with representatives of the Twickenham sorting office site development in January and learnt they are still trying to finalise the planning agreement with the council. We remain

confident that public access through Twickenham Junction Rough will move forwards in the near future and we reiterated our desire for the



The main station development has been delayed until after the Rugby World Cup in late 2015, although station improvement works are scheduled for this year. This means that the riverside pathway from the station to Moormead Park has also been delayed, until 2016 at the earliest.

Crane Park improvements

Further work has been completed at the Mill Road site in Crane Park and two new carved benches have been installed (a stag beetle and a heron bench). We are working with The Trust

Other project work

We have recently received funding under the GLA's "Big Green Fund" to enhance four wetland sites, working with Richmond and Hounslow councils and other partners. We have already commissioned a woodland archaeology investigation, considering the age and historical uses of the woodland along the lower Crane between Donkey Wood and Crane Park, as well as a new map and leaflet for Donkey Wood.

We have recently finished a project, funded in part by Hounslow Innovations Awards, to create a leaflet for the area around Pevensey Rd Nature Reserve and Feltham Marshalling Yards. Additional funding from Metropolitan Parks and Gardens Association provided a further carved bench (the "tawny owl bench") in Pevensey. This bench is alongside the new cycle and footpath through the reserve which links through de Brome fields and into Hanworth Park. More improvements are scheduled in these areas over the next year and much of it will be implemented through our volunteer partners, including TCV, LWT, Environment Trust and Green Corridor.

Citizen Science Monitoring Programmes

We have recently submitted a detailed proposal, partnered by Froglife Environmental, to undertake a citizen science programme of monitoring for phosphate along the River Crane. Phosphate is the key parameter causing the river to be classed as moderate to poor under the EU Water Framework Directive, and this programme is designed to engage local people in finding out the causes and helping to develop solutions.

In partnership with ZSL we have also adopted a "Riverfly Monitoring site" at Mill Road weir. This is part of a national river water quality monitoring programme that will record changes in water quality in the river and allow us to detect pollution events that might otherwise go unnoticed. We will be recruiting for people interested in involvement in both these projects in March, subject to funding being granted.

Visitor Surveys

We carried out the fifth of our twice-annual surveys this January and were astounded by the numbers, over 1500 people being counted entering or leaving the Meadway entrance of Crane Park for example. This is as many as in July 2013 and in half the daylight hours. The large numbers using and enjoying the parks are a wonderful sight and a powerful reminder to ourselves and the councils that our open spaces are very important to us.

Board Changes

This month we welcomed Joe Pecorelli and Jane Satchwell as new co-opted members of the Board of Trustees. Both are good Friends of FORCE and have been supportive over a number of years. Our Treasurer, Anna Smyk, will be standing down as Trustee from the AGM in November 2014, and we would be keen to talk to anyone interested in taking on this role. Anna has kindly agreed to work with a new Treasurer before and after the AGM.

A New Strategy for FORCE

Introduction

Since its inception FORCE has changed and developed significantly. The trustees of FORCE have recently been considering where it should focus its efforts in future, with the aim of putting together a strategy to help direct FORCE over the coming years. One key driver for this has been the process of incorporation, which also provides an opportunity to review the organisational purpose and Objects.

We want to share our thoughts so far with our supporters and to invite your comment so we can take this into account when developing our plans.

Our main concerns are that we need to:

- Review and possibly re-define what FORCE is and what it does following organic development over time
- Examine the large number of activities FORCE does, prioritise more effectively, and make sure the group doesn't overreach itself

Main Points

What We Are and What We Do - Updating our 'Objects'

FORCE's 'Objects' are its legal statement of charitable purpose as registered by the Charity Commission and there are several reasons why we need to update them:

- Trustees believe that FORCE is both an environmental and a community organisation with both environmental and social impact. However this isn't fully reflected in our original Objects
- We have seen the slow geographic extension of our practical activities along the Crane valley into most of LB Richmond and much of LB Hounslow over the last ten years
- However, FORCE also has an increasing strategic interest in the whole Crane, and this would mean expanding the geographical remit that forms part of the current Objects

Setting Priorities and Managing Resources

We need to be clearer about our priorities and we need to be careful not to overreach ourselves and lose quality as a result. At the same time, we view breadth of work as a key feature of FORCE and don't want to lose this, so we want to increase the resources available to us. FORCE has no paid staff (and doesn't plan to employ any in the foreseeable future) so we aim to do this by developing our membership, our trustee board and our volunteers, by working more in partnership with other organisations, and by using more contract services where appropriate.

Our draft overarching aims are:

- To increase the environmental value of the Crane and DNR* corridors
- To increase public use and appreciation of the Crane and DNR corridors
- To increase educational use of the Crane and DNR corridors
- To enhance local public management of the Crane and DNR corridors at a borough and catchment level

At this stage these are draft aims and we recognise some of them as needing further work. We are also beginning to set out more specific aims and activities and would welcome your thoughts about what you consider to be priorities. We expect to develop our strategy in the first quarter of 2014 following supporters' input.

 - i. Legal (covering both the organisation itself and its activities)
- 3. Joining the trustee board. Whilst we need longer term trustees to provide stability and continuity, we are also open to the idea of co-opting members to the board for a shorter period of time for those wishing to make a short term contribution to a specific issue via membership of the board.
