

Newsletter 57 Spring 2018

Dear Friends,

Welcome to our Spring 2018 newsletter. We are very pleased to have confirmed our programme of walks, talks, community learning and volunteering events for the spring and summer. These are listed at the end of this newsletter and we have also produced a leaflet "Crane Valley Events" for local libraries and other outlets.

Heathrow Third Runway Proposals

Heathrow lies largely within the River Crane catchment and existing activities at the airport already affect the quality and integrity of the river corridor.

We are concerned about the direct effects of the Third Runway proposals on the Longford and Upper Duke of Northumberland's River — as the runway will sit on top of both rivers as well as the River Colne — and the noise and air pollution impacts on the Crane corridor. We are also just as concerned about the indirect effects — eg new transport links plus other infrastructure developments on local open spaces.

FORCE submitted a detailed objection to the proposals in March. We noted that any scheme needed to consider the regional level impacts of the project on open space – the Thames, Colne and Brent catchments as well as the Crane – incorporating all the locations where Heathrow undertook its own consultation events. We asked for a detailed assessment of the impacts on open space across this wider impact area followed by a long-term investment programme to protect and improve this open space network.

Volunteer Activities

Our programme of monthly volunteer days has continued, with events on the Butts Farm side of Crane Park and Pevensey Nature Reserve, over the last couple of months. Both were supported by Hounslow's rangers, newly employed by Lampton Greenspace 360 following the demise of Carillion earlier this year. Their support enabled us to remove around one tonne of litter at the two sites, including a dozen car tyres, and assorted large metal posts and water tanks, that had been a local eye sore over many years.

The Community Learning programme with TCV continues this summer, with eight days practical training in marginal river habitat and meadow management techniques. On the first of these days we will be joined again by the shire horses from Operation Centaur.

There are three weekly Green Gyms along the lower Crane – at Pevensey Nature Reserve, Hounslow Heath and Mereway Nature Park – held on Mondays, Tuesdays and Wednesdays respectively. These provide gentle outdoor exercise through improving the value of local habitats for people and wildlife. All are free and welcome new volunteers.

Crane Park Usage Surveys

FORCE will be holding our summer park usage surveys on Sunday 15th July 2018, based at the Meadway entrance to Crane Park and at Marsh Farm Lane in Twickenham, from 6 am to 8 pm. If you can spare an hour or two to help with the surveys at either location, you would be most welcome. The counting is very straightforward, full instructions are given, and help is always on hand. The usage surveys are very important in helping us to understand how the local community is using its open spaces, and in helping us to build the case for more investment Please open spaces. gary.backler@force.org.uk if you can help.

Duke of Northumberland's River

Riverside Walk in Isleworth has benefitted from the installation of around 500 metres of marginal river habitat in March this year. This work has been designed to improve the aesthetic and wildlife value of this reach and to encourage the migration of water voles into this part of the river. The work is being complemented by regular litter picks by TCV and there are proposals to set up a new Friends group to help co-ordinate these activities.

Plans are being finalised for further river improvements in the stretch along the RFU stadium in the autumn, followed by the widening of the pathway along this 750 metre length of the river.

River Pollution Management

The Crane is an urban river and subject to a range of urban pollution problems. These include – misconnected properties, plumbed into the surface water rather than the foul water drainage; polluted run-off from roads and; a particular problem in the Crane catchment, glycol de-icer in the run-off from Heathrow Airport, which turns the river grey-green and promotes fungal growth on the river bed.

We are working, through the Citizen Crane project, and with partners including the Environment Agency, Heathrow, Thames Water and the local authorities, to tackle each of these problems. Our Citizen Crane teams have helped identify major misconnections in recent months – including a school and a new housing estate; we are working with ZSL and Thames 21 to develop a London wide "Position Paper on road run-off; and Heathrow has started construction of a new £20m treatment plant to deal with the glycol problem.

The Citizen Crane volunteer project has just completed four years of monthly monitoring at eleven locations - we hope to see real improvements in the ecological value of the river over the next two years of investigation.

Twickenham Station and the Rough

FORCE met with the developers of Twickenham Station in March to talk about the detailed plans for creating the new riverside pathway linking the site to Moormead. We also took the opportunity to ask the developer and Network Rail to get together and resolve the river bank littering problem by the London Road bridge entrance to the station.

We understand that an agreement has been reached between Richmond Council and the Brewery Wharf developer to complete the remediation work in Twickenham Junction Rough. This work has commenced, and we remain hopeful this new public green space will be open this summer

We look forward to seeing you at one or more of our events over the next few months.
