

1. Background

The carved benches across the lower Crane valley are a concept created by FORCE to enhance the pathways and open spaces. Over time they have increased to their current number of 14 with two new benches planned in the Autumn of 2018. The benches are designed to reflect the area in which they are installed and some have been dedicated as memorials to local people.

They are widely recognised as assets to the areas and are well used and loved.


Over time, weather, usage and sadly vandalism, have taken their toll on the condition of the benches and it is time to create and implement a project and on-going programme of bench maintenance activities.

2. Purpose

To audit the state of the current bench conditions and undertake a refurbishment of each bench as required.

6. Conclusion

The project was completed within the planned timescales, although additional materials were needed. The amount of repair and restoration undertaken during the project clearly highlighted that the need for the work was essential to ensure the longevity of the benches. It also highlighted the need to inspect and maintain the benches more often.

During the work, a lot of interest was generated, with many open space users commenting on the activities and thanking the volunteers for the improvement. This highlighted both the positive benefit of the benches and the feedback from park users, local authorities, social media etc. was overwhelmingly positive.

In conclusion, having completed the project, it was agreed that this needed to be an ongoing activity which should form part of our volunteer day events where possible. The inspection and maintenance of the benches has now been incorporated into the plans for the 2018/2019 volunteer day programme. In addition, as not all benches may have been captured during the volunteer days, it has been agreed by the FORCE trustees that an annual bench maintenance inspection would be undertaken to maintain all benches and to capture any refurbishment requirements that fell outside of those completed during the volunteer day activities.
